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
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### WELCOME LETTER


In June we observe Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit. After his Resurrection, Jesus appeared to his followers in the Upper Room where they were hiding and afraid. Jesus breathed on them. He had two messages for them:



These messages are for us today also. We received in baptism the same Holy Spirit that Jesus breathes and gives to the disciples in the Upper Room. This Spirit is living in us and gives us life in God, enabling us also today to be faithful disciples. It is up to us to be open to listening to the voice of the Spirit and responsive to the Spirit's promptings. ## SISTERS' WORDS OF WISDOM

In the Benedictine contemplative tradition, we are called to learn to balance prayer and work, Ora et Labora, balancing our being and our doing. For those who lean toward "doing", this balancing act can be a bit of a challenge. This was the case for Sister Mary Lou Dummer, OSB, at least until the Spirit invited her into a space of "being" as a result of the COVID pandemic and its impact on the community of St. Paul's Monastery.

Like many of the Sisters, Sister Mary Lou has been very active throughout her life, and has served many functions within the monastery and in ministries in the broader community. "There's a lot of Martha in me yet, which I'm glad for because I wouldn't want just to 'Be', sitting in a corner forever," she said with a laugh. "I've got to get out there and do [Jesus'] work. That's who I am."

From a variety of roles, including elementary school teacher and principal, parish liturgy, sub-prioress, Oblate director, Sister Mary Lou has worn many different hats. Her doing started early in life. Growing up on the Dummer farm she had the opportunity to work the tractor and mow the lawn. Another early role was learning to be a Christian Clown. "I took a class. This was when I was down in Marshall. Then when we were up here, I brought the clown ministry here. The big thing of being a Christian clown is doing service to elderly, going to nursing homes. I was a hobo, Zorba."

By contrast, her role as sub-prioress was considerably more demanding. She had responsibility for leadership and governance of the monastic community and serving as ex-officio member of the Leadership Team/Monastic Council/Board of Directors. She supervised the liturgy and dietary departments and served on the Benedictine Center Advisory Committee. As Oblate Director, she is responsible for initial formation and on-going formation of the Oblates.





## TISTEN BEFORE YOU LEAP

On May 9, Mother and Father Goose's patient, watchful waiting was rewarded. After nearly a month on the monastery rooftop nest, with parents enduring snow and rain, the eggs hatched. Mother and Father Goose were blessed with five beautiful goslings, and the proud parents lovingly paraded their little ones on a tour of the green roof. The goslings looked like small puffs of yellowish brown fluff. They dutifully followed along, exploring the strange flat landscape of sedum plants and rocks on the green roof.



By the next day, Mother and Father Goose decided it was time to move on. A roof may be a good place for a nest, but it is not a good place to raise a family. Little did the goslings know that their life was about to change forever.

Mother and Father Goose left their babies alone on the roof and flew down to the monastery courtyard and started honking for them to come down. Until now, the goslings had never in their short lives been



without their parents. From their vantage point, it must have looked like a very long way down, yet one by one, five goslings responded to the call, trusted, and leaped. After bouncing on the soft soil of the courtyard garden, they got up and followed their parents, eventually moving on to a nearby pond. A whole new world opened for the goslings, much wider and more beautiful than the roof or anything they could imagine.

In the Prologue, Benedict asks us, "What is more delightful than the voice of the the Lord calling out to us? See how God in his love shows us the way of life" (Prol. 19-20). We are invited to listen and follow God's voice calling out to us. Benedict was probably not thinking about geese honking and goslings leaping. Yet the goslings' trusting response to their parents call can teach us about trusting and following our God.

Be open to listening for God's call in your life Be trusting and ready to follow.

Be ready to let go of whatever you have known.

Be ready to bounce.

Be open to a wider and more beautiful world than you have ever known.

This month's Employee Spotlight article features Roberta Glynn, a Licensed Practical Nurse for the St. Paul's Monastery's Healthcare Unit where she aids in facilitating health care for the Sisters' nursing care needs. She started in a casual position in June of 2021 working evening shifts and was promoted to a full-time position in January 2022. When describing her experience thus far working for the Monastery, she states, "The first time I entered the Monastery I experienced this is home. The calm, peaceful environment was overwhelming. The best aspects [of] working here are having very little stress and respect from employees and the Sisters. The presence of God is here too." Before working for St. Paul's Monastery, Roberta worked the area of sleep disorder medicine for 20 years. She also obtained a college degree in Psychology.

Roberta has had a long journey with her Catholic faith. She grew up in the parish of St. Jerome's, and then as an adult at St. Patrick's, St. Casmir, Transfiguration, and now St. Mary's of the Lake in White Bear Lake. Her father was enlisted in the Navy and fought in WWII, Korea, and Vietnam and continued a life in the military (Air Force). Her mother was a graduate of St. Joseph's Academy and attended St. Catherine College. Her parents started a family in 1952 and she is the second oldest with four brothers. During her childhood, she grew up on the East Side of St. Paul with very large Catholic families, where the neighborhood enjoyed spending their spare time in the outdoors. She often went exploring in the nearby forest, sledding down hills, skating on ponds, and loved to greet new babies every spring at a nearby farm.

Roberta started nursing school in 1974 and graduated in 1975. In 1976, she married her husband and had her son, Matthew, in 1978, her daughter, Jennifer, in 1980, and my youngest son, Joseph, in 1982. She also has 12 grandchildren, of which the oldest just got married and she hopes to be a great-grandmother soon.

After living on the East Side of St. Paul, Roberta recently moved to White Bear Lake. Her hobbies and interests outside of work include going up to the lake where she can fish, go four-wheeling, and relax and enjoy nature. Gardening is her favorite activity, and she loves spring when she can be outside, plant, and watch things grow. 


