May is, without a doubt, the busiest month at the Monastery. We have all these wonderful appreciation events for Volunteers, Oblates and Staff. We also have our Staff In-Service which was very affirming of our model of "servant leadership" (see article below).

The most significant event is our preparation and celebration of the Feast of Pentecost (May 20th). Five Oblates completed their course of study and went through the discernment retreat and choose to be Benedictine Oblates. 

- His emphasis on <u>Silence</u> being essential for any mature spiritual growth: "Silence is a sacrament."
- He lived "ordinary holiness" in seeking God each day in each situation, each person, each class.

On Tuesday, May 14th, the Department Heads gathered in the Dining Room for our quarterly presentation. Jeff Dols presented to the group on Servant Leadership as it relates to Benedictine Values.

Jeff Dols serves on the Advisory Committee for the Benedictine Center. He has experience in the for

profit and nonprofit sector, having held leadership roles in multiple business architecture and business process improvement efforts over the past 20 years, for companies such as Wells Fargo and U.S. Bank. Jeff also served as Executive Director of the Franciscan Spirituality Center in La Crosse, Wisconsin. Jeff holds a B.A. in Economics and an M.A. in Servant Leadership from Viterbo University in La Crosse.

He quoted Robert K. Greenleaf from his essay, *The Servant as Leader:* "The servant-leader is servant first... It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead. That person is sharply different from one who is leader first, perhaps because of the need to assuage an unusual power drive or to acquire material possessions..."

This model of department head leadership fits for leadership in a Benedictine Monastery.


