July 11, of course, is the Feast of St. Benedict. A sixth century Christian monk, St. Benedict was the author of the Benedictine Rule, a short and simple book which has proven to be remarkably adaptable for the past 15 centuries. Today, Benedictine monks and nuns around the world number more than 20,000 in about 400 monasteries. We cherish as part of the Benedictine family the 25,400 laywomen and men called Oblates and Associates. Together we aspire, one day as a time, in fidelity to live the Holy Gospel and the Benedictine Rule.

Having myself lived more than 50 years as a Benedictine woman, my respect and gratitude for our wise heritage continues to deepen. May this great legacy be known and received by our children for many generations to come.

Remembering Sister Monica Raway, OSB

Sister Monica Raway died peacefully on June 25, 2021 at St. Paul's Monastery. Sister Monica (Mary Ellen) was born on November 26, 1925 in Miesville, Minnesota, one of five children born to Louis and Barbara (Eckart) Raway. She attended country school near Miesville through seventh grade. For eighth grade, she attended Guardian Angels School in Hastings and went on to graduate from Hastings High School. Her first job was at a ski factory in Hastings, lacing snowshoes for the military, until the factory burned down. She then began her career as an office worker.

Seeking advice for her call to religious life, she sought out a priest at the Cathedral of St. Paul and he directed her to St. Paul's Priory, a few blocks away. Mary Ellen entered as an aspirant in September 1952 and became

a novice in June 1953. She made her first monastic profession on July 11, 1954 and her perpetual monastic profession July 11, 1957.

She served as a house sister at Assumption in Richfield, at Immaculate Heart of Mary, and St. Bernard's in St. Paul. For five years, her ministry was at the Archbishop's residence in St. Paul. When she retired to the Monastery, she served in the kitchen and was a community driver known as the "Roadrunner."

She had a love for praying the Psalms at the Liturgy of the Hours and for the Eucharist. She enjoyed sharing riddles, knitting, craft work and reading. She especially liked re-runs of Lawrence Welk and watching the news.

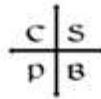

Sisters' Words of Wisdom: Karen Sames, OSB

Resilient, humorous, and kind to all – these are just a few of the adjectives used to describe Sister Karen Sames, OSB. You may talk to Sister Karen when you call the Monastery; she spends most days as the receptionist for St. Paul's Monastery. Before coming to Monastic life, Sister Karen cared for people in her nursing career, spending several decades as a nurse. In many ways, Sister Karen has been a caregiver most of her life, extending her kindness and generosity to those she meets.

As a child, Sister Karen lost her father before she was even two years old. Her mom, Angela, then raised six children on her own before her own untimely death when Karen was just 33 years old. Karen talks about her family and her extended family with great care. You can tell that they are close and, with all the death in the family, have grown even closer with time. "You come to realize how short life is" and that the best way to go through things is "with family," Sister Karen remarks. Today, Sister Karen and her sisters enjoy spending time with Karen's eight nieces and nephews and 14 grand nieces and nephews. They operate as a large, caring, and generous family.

Sister Karen was born in New Prague and grew up in Shakopee, Minnesota. She received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing from St. Catherine's University and a certificate in Monastic Studies and Scripture from St. John's University. It was only after working for ten years as a nurse that she decided to enter Monastic life. She decided that there "had to be more to life." Her mom worried about her new choice in life but, along with the rest of the family, supported her decision. Then, in 1990, she took her first vows.

When asked about scripture or other inspirational verses that have helped her in her life, she quickly turns to a few favorites, including the commonly known Jeremiah 29:11, "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope" (NRSVCE).

A Lake Superior Morning in Roseville

There was a time when inspiration leaped at me. Surrounded me, surprised, and awed me. Those were Lake Superior Days. I wrote columns about them. I wrote a book about them. Then we moved.

Recently, I woke to find Lake Superior beckoning from our bedroom window in Roseville, where we now live. A band of heavy blue, spanning the horizon to the southwest with no end in sight as it had in Schroeder. The thrill was momentary of course, my rational brain denied the lake's presence in south central Minnesota. It was a day of miracles, nonetheless.

A walk in Central Park that afternoon, revealed tiny blue violets carpeting the ground, reminding me of my daily walks on the Superior Hiking Trail, as I followed the birth of a spring landscape from flower to flower: Bloodroot, Dutchman's britches, and marsh marigolds as they pushed their way toward the sun. In Roseville, spring perennials do not appear in such abundance, but the violets adorn the trails. Miracles too.

During that same walk, I also witnessed what I had never seen on Lake Superior, the touchdown of seven magnificent Trumpeter swans. With a raucous babble of loud bugles and horns, their arrival shattered the silence. Eight-foot wingspans battled for space, so heavy that they scooped rather than touched the lake as they landed. The first to find balance rocketed after others, necks stretched low and long like glorious white shafts of light.



I imagine that you, like I, have experienced a sense of lightening with the gradual lifting of COVID-19 restrictions.


Leaving the apartment without donning my mask feels strange. A feeling of being exposed, the air fresh around my face, my expressions no longer limited to crinkled eyes – COVID's simulated smiles of greeting and pleasure. While others enjoy a greater sense of freedom, my husband and I find our lives more confined as his increased need for oxygen demands we limit our departures from the residence to less than two hours. Because his health is so at risk, we wear or carry masks wherever we go.

When I returned from my walk in Central Park, I settled down to read a bit, choosing books of poetry as I often do before writing. That day I selected Mary Oliver's work, loving the way she transforms the ordinary into the miraculous. Her poem, "Poppies," in *New and Selected Poems*, reflected my experience. That light invites happiness, which is indeed, a ". . . kind of holiness, palpable and redemptive."

May your lives be filled with light. May that happiness become the holiness that draws us closer to one another and may that union eventually transform this darkening world.
